I have been battery powered one that was highly rated and had the obvious considering replacing those with battery powered cars as well, advantage of not needing gas, oil, tune ups, belts, hoses or any but I'm waiting for more developments in that technology as it other high maintenance needs and it was a lot quieter than conventional riding lawn mowers. It cost more, but nearly all of make them much more versatile and desirable. the cost for running it was all up front, so once paid for it costs little to use. Shortly after purchasing that mower, I discovered the the manufacturer was offering a sizable rebait which I got. With that rebait I purchased a snow plow for it that made it even more useful as it plowed the snow from my driveway and sidewalks with ease. It came with deep cycle SLABs that were good for 5 years. At that time, I decided to upgrade to lithium batteries, as they were only slightly more than the standard replacement units and were a lot lighter and much more efficient.

The next step was to get a lithium power station to power my shack. It is a fairly light unit that can run my radio equipment for and extended period of time in a mobile mode or it can also work as an uninterruptible power supply in my shack while attached to the mains, which is what I use it for mostly. It also worked well for various events that were set up in remote locations. I opted for that unit to try it out to see how it would work as an experiment of working off of the grid. It is an economical way to check out such a system. I would eventually like to get a

Arrl.org, Update July 2, 2024

Effective 12:00pm ET / 16:00 UTC we will be returning Logbook of The World[®] (LoTW[®]) to service.

As work progressed on the network, some users encountered LoTW opening briefly during which some 6600 logs were uploaded. The logs were not processed until this weekend as we tested that the interfaces to LoTW were functioning properly.

We are taking steps to help manage what will likely be a huge influx of logs.



We are requesting that if you have large uploads, perhaps from contests or from a DXpedition, please wait a week or two before uploading to give LoTW a chance to catch up. We have also implemented a process to reject logs with excessive duplicates. Please do not upload your entire log to "ensure" your contacts are in LoTW as they will be rejected. Lastly, please do not call ARRL Headquarters to report issues you are having with LoTW. You can contact support at LoTW-help@arrl.org.

Through the end of the year, you may experience planned times when LoTW will be unavailable. We have been using this time to evaluate operational and infrastructure improvements we would like to make to LoTW. Those times will be announced.

We appreciate your patience as we worked through the challenges keeping LoTW from returning to service. We know the importance of LoTW to our members, and to the tens of thousands of LoTW users who are not ARRL members. LoTW, just behind *QST*, is our second most popular ARRL benefit.
