HAMS in the Park

We've had a new activity this year. We've met twice for "Hams in the Park".

The first meeting was at Hass Park in La Crosse, the second meeting was at Glen Fox Park in Onalaska, and the third meeting is scheduled for July 15 at Goose Island.

The activity has already paid off for us in light of the new Field Day location we used this year. Meeting at Hass Park showed us that it would not make a suitable place for Field Day because of the lack of bathroom and the difficult access for our wheelchair-bound members. We were able to make use of activity to do a number of things, though. Some of our members who participated got on the air and were able to put some DX in the log, others were active on the VHF bands. We were also able to use the time to finish the adjustments needed on the 20/75 meter antenna that we used for Field Day. It was the antenna that David Peters (KB9EWG) used to successfully contact Australia, so something went right with it.

The second meeting happened early in June. We did it at Glen Fox Park in Onalaska. We identified a magical vertical antenna that resonated on every band without traps or making any adjustments. It was a fairly short session, and I feel bad because Charlie (KD9HSI) brought lunch to share, but I couldn't stick around to share it with him. It was good to have the session to validate Glen Fox Park as one that could be a good Field Day site for us, though.

Hams in the Park is a great, relaxed atmosphere to get help with things that are giving you challenges, too. If something is frustrating you and causing difficulty, bring it out. You may find somebody who can help. If you want to just come out and do some portable operating and socializing, this is the perfect venue.

There will be a new opportunity at the upcoming meeting on July 15. It will be at Goose Island. That is the day of the NAQP RTTY contest. We hope to use the opportunity to give people a chance to work some RTTY and get some exposure to a mode that may be a new one. Of course, you don't have to feel obliged to work RTTY if you don't want. You'll certainly be welcome to come out and participate in another way, or just to hang out, ask questions, and enjoy yourself.
